Ironically, our number one mission is to keep people out of the hospital by keeping them healthy. We're moving away from traditional fee-for-service medicine toward population health management, with its emphasis on continuous and coordinated care. Of course, we will continue to be a leader in caring for patients with complex conditions and will remain the destination of choice for patients with

acute illnesses requiring the most advanced procedures and inpatient care.

Taken together, it makes New York a safer place. And proves that to care for a city, it takes a system.
