Message from the Director

I am pleased to invite supporters of the health and safety community to join us at the next Clinical Climate Change Conference, January 24, 2020, in New York City. In addition to discussions on extreme weather events and health effects on vulnerable worker populations, the program will highlight new research: modelling the health effects of climate change, air pollution in cardiopulmonary diseases, emerging infectious diseases, and patient communication and effective advocacy strategies.

Climate change is an important part of the future of health and safety in the workplace, and climate conditions can worsen existing issues and lead to new unanticipated hazards. Heat-related illnesses are of particular concern.

Temperature increases linked to climate change worsen air quality. In addition to conditions you would expect to increase as a result of air pollution, such as asthma and other lung diseases, our research shows that there are many downstream effects, with inflammation in the body associated with neurotoxicity, neurodevelopmental disorders, and increased insulin resistance.

This year's conference expands our network of partners to include the American Public Health Association, American Lung Association and Columbia's Center for Earth Ethics. Last year, more than 125 physicians, nurses, researchers, students, and allied health and safety professionals attended. We look forward to seeing you there.
