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## Message from the Director

Jobs are undergoing profound changes, with the transformative effects of new technologies, changing demographics, and climate change, all of which are leading to new challenges for worker health and safety. Changes in the labor market include a shift from permanent, full-time jobs to temporary agency and part-time work, selfemployment, and other non-standard forms of work. The fragmentation of our workforce leads to insufficient or nonexisting safety training, a lack of preventive intervention. and workers' compensation coverage when injuries or illnesses do occur. Stressors and psychosocial risks at work and the onset of non-communicable diseases resulting from lifestyle changes and coping habits are also on the rise. The introduction of robotics and new technologies creates new opportunities but also challenges in terms of potential impacts on physical and mental health.

It is important for governments, employers and unions, and other stakeholders to seize opportunities to create a safe and healthy future for all workers. This May, our Division of Occupational Medicine will join a meeting at the United Nations with the International Commission on Occupational Health, the National Institute for Occupational Safety and Health, and others to participate in a discussion on the future of work. It is critical that health and safety is a priority in the #FutureOfWork discussions happening globally as well as in our own communities. Those discussions will set the stage for the Annual <u>New York-New Jersey ERC</u> meeting to be held at the Icahn School of Medicine at Mount Sinai on September 20th. Please hold the date!
